

Highlights from the CBH/SAA Annual Meeting Pam Severtson

The meetings started off with the Friday February 24th (2023) Legislative Meeting presented by Bill Gaines of Gaines and Associates and our Legislative Director, Amanda Duchardt. They brought us all up to speed on what has been going on legislatively and where we plan on going. Amanda updates us monthly in the CBH/SAA newsletter.

Saturday morning, the meeting started off with the CBH/SAA Officers Reports and what has occurred over the past year in their jurisdiction. It was noticeable that some regions are not being represented due to lack of participation. We would like to encourage more archers get involved. 2 regions that need assistance with representation is the NCFAA Region which are the clubs/shops in the San Francisco area. Also, the San Diego area could use some representation. If you are interested, contact the CBH/SAA Secretary and she can put you in contact with the local contact.

We have a few new faces for CBH/SAA Officer positions. Robert Tehee will be taking Daniel Stafford's place as 2nd VP Field and Lisa Rodriguez will be taking Karen Keating's place as 2nd VP Target. Thank you to Daniel & Karen who have given their time for CBH/SAA and welcome those who are stepping in.

The "Run Reg" system was on full discussion at the meeting. Although some had some hiccups, while trying to register for the state shoots, in general, it will continue to be used.

Johnnie Waddles, IBEP Chairman, reported that the Hunter Education classes are back on full swing with the field day. They had been paused during COVID but are back on now for 2023 and going forward.

The NFAA agenda items have not been received by the NFAA Director, Gary McCain. NFAA is working on them and there will be some, as the 2 year term is due to amend for the November edition. The CBH/SAA petitions were discussed and voted on and the updated Bylaws and Standing Rules are available on the website.

The 2023 State Field will be held at Oranco Bowmen. This will be June 10-11, 2023 and this will also be in conjunction with the NFAA Southwest Section Outdoor Shoot. The State Marked 3D will be held at Oranco Bowmen on 7-16-23. This is a stand alone shoot and not a piggyback.

The 2024 CBH/SAA Annual Meeting will be held in Visalia. This will be the California Archery Hall of Fame Banquet with the inductees to be announced in a later edition of the newsletter.

Legislative Team Update

Greetings CBH/SAA friends and family!

The State Legislative season is picking up speed. Here are a few key updates:

It's BAAAACK! AB 28 Firearms: Excise Tax has now been amended to impose an excise tax in the amount of 11% on the retail sale a firearms, firearm parts, and ammunition. Coined the "Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act", AB 28 would become operative on July 1, 2024. Like AB 1223 and AB 1227 - legislation we defeated in 2022 – AB 28 would require the revenues from the tax to be deposited in a "Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Fund" and used to fund firearm violence prevention, education, and research. In general, AB 28 is another effort to price California's law-abiding hunters and shooters out of owning firearms. Also, as one member of the Legislative Team stated, "This is an example of government trying to solve a societal problem on the backs of folks/groups that are only tangentially involved. I do not know the solution to this issue, but the burden should not be borne by only one small segment of the population." CBH/SAA signed onto the CHCC coalition letter of opposition. AB 28 has been set to be heard in Assembly Public Safety Committee on April 11th.

SB 8 Firearms: Liability (as amended) would require a firearm owner to maintain a gun liability insurance policy covering losses or damages resulting from any negligent or accidental use of that firearm. In a late victory, SB 8 was further amended on March 23 to delete its provision which would have made those that own a firearm civilly liable for each incidence of damage, injury or death resulting from the use of that firearm! CBH/SAA signed onto the CHCC coalition letter of opposition. SB 8 has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee but has not yet been set to be heard.

The California Waterfowl Association (CWA) is sponsoring AB 859 Hunting Navigable Waters, which is intended to clarify the public's right to use navigable floodwaters for hunting and other purposes. AB 859 proposes to amend Section 2016 of the Fish and Game Code to make it consistent with a 1985 State Attorney General Opinion (and

subsequent State Opinions) that found that hunting is an integral part of the public's right to access and use navigable waters. Specifically, AB 859 would place language in Section 2016 that expressly states that its provisions do not restrict the public's right to use navigable waters for hunting, fishing, or other public purposes. If passed, AB 859 will help ensure that sportsmen and women exercising their rights on navigable floodwaters are not wrongly cited for trespassing. But please note that, under AB 859, Section 2016's restrictions on hunting would still apply to any non-navigable waters and lands that meet the signage and other requirements of that Section. CBH/SAA recently signed a CHCC coalition letter of support for this legislation. AB 859 has been referred to the Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife (AWPW) Committee, but has yet to be set for hearing. Finally, we are still in need of support related to the proposed ban on archery hunting at Los Banos Wildlife Area. Hmmm...... Here's my take. With 3D I am never EXACTLY sure why I hit a 12 ring or why I missed it. Did I slightly misjudge the yardage and make a slight mistake that counteracted it? How many times are there multiple arrows in the 12 ring that were "shot for" different distances by the shooter? In Field, you have the exact yardage. You have an exact aiming location. Can you hit it? Can you hit it repeatedly? Shooting Field will no doubt make a shooter more accurate and consistent.... not to mention that you get to shoot A LOT more arrows while on the course.

introduction to Field Archery

While the history of archery predates us by 60,000-72,000 years and has been instrument in the survival an advancement of man, archery for a recreational purpose is a relatively recent occurrence. As firearms replaced archery equipment,

for hunting and warfare, utilization of the bow declined.

In the late 1,700s archery as a sport or recreation saw a resurgence in the upper class with early competitions shooting targets off castle walls or targets line up on the front lawns of the gentry. The mid 1800's sees the first attempts at organizing archery as a competitive sport. Many small groups were formed across Europe and after many gatherings a standardized "York Round" was established. Once again, archery faded somewhat as tennis and other sports became more popular with the middle class.

Archery competitions continued for years to consist of multi-color targets aligned in a field and is still the preferred archery course for World Archery (Olympic).

In the 1940s the concept of field archery was introduced by the fledgling National Field Archery Association (NFAA)

. The members of the NFAA wanted something that added some interest to shooting bows and could help them become better at bow hunting.

Formed in 1939 the NFAA is the largest archery association worldwide but has strong ties to USA Archery as well as World Archery (Formerly Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc).

Early on the NFAA established the "Field Round". Also known as a roving round, the field round consists of 28 targets spaced at different distances from 20 feet to 80 yards 4 arrows are shot at each target with a maximum score of 20pts per target. No longer are targets all facing one direction, and flat, now shots maybe up or down hill, archers may be standing on side hills or in mock "tree stands." The Hunter Round was added, and differed from the field round, in that the target face is different and the target distances were much more varied. This added more interest as, again, designed to help bow hunter proficiency the different distances were more familiar to hunters.

The next outdoor round added by the NFAA was the "Animal Round." While still 28 targets, the number of arrows shot will depend on the skill of the archer. Much like hunting, 1 arrow is the goal here.

Field Archery stands on its own with state, national and world events, but is also an excellent way to get into hunting shape., and field archery season is year-round.

Following are a list or terms and or procedures that The X counts as a 5 but all Xs are tallied at the end will help with your first formal shoot.

Target Lane: In an official NFAA round there are 28 targets set up in 28 Target Lanes.

Target: Not only referring to the specific target face scoring ring. but also which target lane you are shooting on.

Group: 4 archers (minimum 3) make up a group. Once the group has assembled at their starting target the group will determine in what order they will shoot. This order will change on the second half. 1 becoming 3 and 2 becoming 4. Also, two of the members of the group will receive then record on the score cards. One group member will be designated but it is a thing. to call arrow scores.

When a target butt includes multiple faces, as in descending order, and make sure you give the two close targets, each archer will have his or her own archers recording scores time to write them down face to shoot. For close targets there will be 4 faces neatly and to update (if needed) the running score. in a square. The first 2 archers will shoot the bottom targets, with 1 shooting the left, and 2 shooting the X = 5, M = 0right. Second pair of archers will shoot the top, with 3 shooting left, and 4 shooting right.

For the 35 walkup there will be a grid of 16 targets. 1 will shoot the first column, 2 shooting the 3rd column,3rd archer shooting the 2nd column and 4th archer shooting the 4th column.

NOTE: The above may seem odd, but the goal is to number of arrows to be shot from the marker for keep archers who are shooting last from having to shoot through or possible break other archers' arrows.

2. In standard NFAA rounds there will be 28 lines to record each target score. Some will be broken into 1st and 2nd half of 14 each. Be sure when marking scores that you start on the score card with the same target you start on. (More than once the author has had to erase a couple of recorded scores when he started on target 10 and scoring on target 1. Each line will have 4 blocks to record arrow scores, 1 to record the total for the target and one to keep a

running total. Score marks should include "M" for miss, 3, 4, or 5 for arrow score, or X for an X ring. to be used as a tiebreak.

Jar Licker: An arrow that just barely touches a scoring ring and receives credit for the higher

NOTE: an arrow does not need to break a scoring line, just touch it.

Inside Out: An arrow that is wholly inside a scoring ring. In some indoor rounds not only are Xs tallied, but also inside out X's. Again, used as a tie break. Sometimes those fat line breaker arrows can hurt!!! **Electronic Scoring**: Not covering here in the intro.

Scoring: When calling scores, call them in Score marks, X, M for miss, or the score number.

Marker or Stake: Each target lane will include numerous markers on the ground indicating the yardage to the target, the round, and division. For adult rounds the markers are White (Field), Red (Hunter), or Yellow (Animal). At a minimum the marker will include the vardage. It may also include walk up or fan targets. Cub and youth markers will also be included on the target lane.

Walk Up or Fan: Most targets on a Field round are For the columns the archer has a choice to shoot top shot with 4 arrows from a single marker. Some 4 markers at different distances from the target, and Score Card: The size, shape and layout, of score the archers will shoot 1 arrow from each distance, starting with the furthest. All 4 archers will shoot before the group moves to the next marker. The markers spread out left to right, but at the same distance. Each archer shoots one arrow from each of the 4 markers.

> walk ups. 2 position walk ups shoot 2 arrows per position.

> Animal Rounds include 3 markers, all in 3 position walk ups. A maximum of 3 arrows are shot. More on animal round scoring in a bit.

The NFAA Field round was created to bridge the gap between bow hunting and FITA style competition events. Designed to be laid out as a roving course like how a golf or disc golf course is created. The 28 targets comprise a full round. Some smaller ranges may shoot 14 targets twice through for a full round. Distances range from 15 - 80 yards in 5-yard increments as well as 10-20 feet in 5-foot increments. Most of the targets the archer will shoot 4 arrows from arrow from each marker. Hunter Round

The NFAA Hunter round was created to bridge the gap, but to increase the challenge as the yardages now are not even 5-yard increment. Distances range from 15 - 80 yards in 5-yard increments as well as 10- 20 feet in 5-foot increments. Most of the targets the archer will shoot 4 arrows from a single stake or marker. A few targets will have multiple markers in which the archer will shoot a single arrow from each of 4 markers in either a walk up (closer distance each marker) or a fan (markers are spread out). Animal Round

The Animal Round shoots and scores a little different from the Field/Hunter rounds.

Most of the targets for the animal round will include 3 yellow markers. The archer will shoot, if needed, one hunting is one clean shot arrow. The archer will shoot 1 arrow from the furthest marker. If that arrow scores up (closer distance each marker) or a fan (markers misses, the archer will shoot another arrow from the next closer marker, scoring that arrow if it is in the target. And finally, one more arrow from the closest marker if needed to get a score.

If there is only 1 marker for the animal target, all three attempts will be made from the same marker.

The Animal Round target is printed on mock animals and include 3 scoring areas. Vitals, Body and the Dot



Archers have the option to shoot a provisional arrow if they are unsure if they scored. However, arrows must be marked, so shot order can be determined or lowest arrow value will score. E.g., if the archer shot a dot on arrow 1 and due to damage to the target could not see the arrow and shoots a provisional from a forward marker, and shoots a body shot. If they can prove shot order, the archer gets 21 for the dot. If they can not prove shot order the archer gets a 2nd arrow body score of 14. MARK YOUR ARROWS. Vanes can be shot off, mark your ARROWS.

Home/Wilderness Training

The light tan FJ 40 headed north at 5:00 PM. Ten and 1/2 hours later, the rig pulled itself off to the side of the road. At first light, packs were shouldered and the long ascent began. Roughly three and a half hours later, we reached our destination amongst the Jeffrey Pines on a small plateau. Just below us was a meadow lined by willow thickets, 100 yards wide.

Camp preparation began immediately with the removal of debris until the small spot would house a sleeping bag handily. I knew it was perfect as a bear had hollowed out this same small flat next to the leaning snag some time distant. The tree's huge trunk would provide a great screen against the prevailing northern breeze midnight would bring.



With my space procured, I took off down the bank with the water pump and container in hand. Not even 80 yards from our camp was a small spring bubbling up from the ground; perfect, I thought. As I returned to camp, I found my 15-year-old friend had placed his sleeping bag right next to mine. Oh, apparently, this was the spot he would've chosen, I guessed. So I found another tree and cleared out the bear scat around it, creating an area large enough to stow my bag. Hanging the first canister of water, I unpacked a second and headed back downhill for camp water. I wanted to be prepared for a late evening return from hunting with provisions already in place. Previous episodes told me this was the best practice.

Upon returning to camp, I was amazed to find my young protege's sleeping bag touching mine once again. Hmmm, I thought, and moved my bag once more with a similar result; a roommate in the wilderness. It wasn't until then that I figured out this gentleman had some fear of what the backcountry could bring. Nor had I any thought earlier that he might be afraid of the dark, but indeed he was.

I, on the other hand, had been sleeping out under the stars for as long as I could recall. My trusty black, wiry-haired dog, Sport, was often my only companion.

At 8 years of age, I remember hiking down to a neighbor's barn to "strike out on my own" - only to have my dad retrieve me at about 1:00 am at my mother's request.

As for the wilderness, my first roadless experience was around age fifteen. My dad had taken my brother and me to the end of the road. From there, we had hiked for several hours, seemingly in a huge circle, which in retrospect, must've been exactly what it was. We never did find the set of three lakes we were looking for.

On the other hand, I had never seen such a beautiful and peaceful country: I had been bitten!

At age 20, I made my first out-of-state hunt. I chose the Flattops of Colorado for this premier solo elk hunt. It was there, I realized my lifelong passion would be hunting the high country above the trees. It was also here, I learned another important lesson; it is almost impossible to move an elk 18 miles by yourself. Luckily I found a very nice man to pack the meat off the hill for only \$80 worth of hay.



For 40 years bowhunters nationwide have experienced one of the most fantastic bow hunting adventures any bowhunter could hope for. Catalina island was the place to be and just 26 miles offshore of Southern California.

Through the 1940s and 50s, hunting for Catalina's famous goats and wild hogs seem to be, for the most part, for the Hollywood bunch. Many of Howard Hill's "Hunting The Hard Way," movie shorts made by Columbia studios were made with Howard and Errol Flynn hunting with bows on the island and fishing offshore from Errol Flynn's famous yacht, (the Sirocco).. These movies were shown across the United States and inspired many a hunter to take up hunting with the bow.

There were also others like Ben Pearson, who made his movie of hunting Catalina Island in full color and was also prominently showing throughout United States to many archery clubs.

All this was just enough to excite bowhunters to make Catalina a real wish to hunt.

In 1960, I was elected president of the California Bowman Hunters and soon after that Fred bear hired me on as his factory representative for the Western States. At this time, one of my goals was to get some type of bow hunting program set up on Catalina Island that they came after meeting with Doug Bombard, Director of hunting on Catalina island. At that time I was setting up Bear Archery dealers in the west with protected territories and Bombard liked my idea of using Bear dealers as hunting agents. After all, archery shops are usually the hub for bowhunters. Doug Bombard agreed to set up some camps to hold 20 hunters. For \$50 and "Bring your own food," you would get a three day hunt of a lifetime. We would get over to the island using Catalina's Sea Express boats, and later came the World War II Grumman two engine nine passenger sea planes. This form of transportation cost \$23 and really added to the whole hunting experience. The flight started by taking off from San Pedro Harbor and then ended with a Disneyland-style, type of water landing at the "Cat" Harbor's Isthmus of Catalina Island, talk about an adventure and you haven't even started hunting yet.

By the end of the three days of hunting, everyone (almost without exception) took one or more goats, and there would almost always be a few wild hogs on the meat pole. We had Fall and Spring hunts and hundreds of bowhunters were clamoring to bowhunt on Catalina Island each season.



During this time Bear archery was promoting, "Be A Two Season Hunter." We put signs up in sporting good stores as well as archery shops saying , "BOWHUNTING SPOKEN HERE". Continued on page 11

It was not only good for sales of, and, but organized archery was booming, too. Memberships in archery clubs and the California Bowman Hunters, of which I was president, seem to double in just four short years. It wasn't long after that, and with the help of Red Slack, owner of Archery Headquarters in El Monte CA, met with Dr. Gary Stanton owner of Santa Cruz Island and kickstarted a similar program for bow- hunters to hunt for that island's famous *Merino sheep* and wild hogs.

Off season hunting like this became a great training ground for new bow hunters, husband and wife, and father and son hunts were soon promoted. Yes, this was an exciting time for bowhunters.

They complained that the goats and wild hogs were not native to the island (they were left there by early day Spanish explorers), they further complained that these animals were now ruining the natural habitat of the island, the humaniacs also expressed concern about certain flowers that only grew on Catalina Island.



Also, eagles and some kind of snake we're also endangered. This also applied to Santa Cruz Island's wild sheep and wild hogs. Well, before we knew it, "the powers that be" won out and a campaign to systematically destroy all of the goats, wild sheep and wild hogs was started and by the middle of the 1990s the wild goat and wild hog hunting was no more, and the famous Catalina Island and Santa Cruz Island bowhunting was no more, and truly the end of an era.

CBH/SAA State Broadhead Championship Tournament General Working Mechanics

- This tournament is designed to appeal to the bowhunter as opposed to the tournament archer. It is designed to offer the hunter some benefits without his/her becoming entangled in the aspects of a Field tournament. NFAA rules do not apply to this event
- The State Broadhead Tournament shall be a one or two day event held on Memorial Day weekend.
- 3. The 2nd Vice President of Hunting or his delegate shall govern this tournament
- 4. The range for this event shall be laid in such a manner as to simulate hunting conditions when possible.
- Archers shall use hunting tackle for this event which is keeping with California State Fish & Game Laws on Big Game Hunting.
 - A. Scoring:
 - 1) Vital—10 Kill-8 Wound-5
 - An arrow must be in the target to score, except a "pass-through" which must be witnessed and scored a witnessed by other shooters in the group.
 - 3) "Bounce-ins and Glance-offs" shall not score.
 - 4) "Antlers" do not score.
 - Shaft of arrow mut touch the line for higher score.
 - 6) Double scoring is required.
 - 7) This shall be a one-arrow tournament at unmarked yardages.
 - B. Divisions and Styles of Shooting:
 - 1) Divisions
 - a) Seniors (65+)
 - b) Adult (18-64): Male and Female
 - c) Young Adult (15-17): Male and Fe-
 - d) Youth (12-14): Male and Female

2) Styles:

- a) Sight Fingers (SF)
- b) Non-Sight (NS)
- c) Release ®
- d) Recurve (RC)
- e) Longbow (L)

C. Awards:

- CBH/SAA Membership (Regular or Associate) is required to compete for awards.
- Guest Class is one Class (Male and Female combined) and there will be no awards.
- 3) No awards will be mailed.
- 4) Cubs and Peewees Participation Awards Only


D. Tackle

- 1) No Mechanical Broadheads
- Only ONE "izer" whether it be stabilizer, equalizer, side bar or any such weighed balance with a total protrusion from the bow not to exceed 12 inches.
- 3) Bow Quivers are allowed in all styles.
- 4) No magnifying scopes are allowed.
- No compound over 80 pounds peak draw weight. Recurves and longbows have no weight limit.
- 6) Binoculars are allowed. No rang finding binoculars allowed even with the battery removed. NO RANGEFINDERS, Period!

- 7) Broadheads must be dulled and meet Fish & Game Codes at all times during the shoot—No Mechanical/ Expandable Blades period!
- 8) Practice blades are allowed if they meet Fish & Game Codes (7/8 minimum diameter
- 9) Broadheads may be subject to size testing at any time during the tournament.
- 10) All bows shall be limited to 300 fps with a 3% tolerance for differences in chronographs.
- Arrow speed may be checked anytime during the tournament.
- 12) Longbows: any type of arrow shaft is allowed.
- 13) Longbows: must be shot off the shelf
- 14) Clickers allowed in all styles.

E. Miscellaneous:

- 1) Cubs and Peewees will shoot field points only
- Parents will be responsible for the supervision of their children at all times.
- 3) All protests to the Protest Committee will be in writing within thirty (20) minutes of the end of the tournament each day an include a \$25 fee which will be returned if the protest is upheld.
- 4) There must be a minimum of three shooters per target at all times.
- Top shooters from each style will be grouped on the 2nd day of the tournament. Clubs and Peewees will not be allowed to shoot in top flight groups.
 NO EXCEPTIONS
- 6) No target or sight notes allowed (sight tapes ok)
- 7) No discussion of yardage prior to shooting. Discussions afterwards must be done in a manner to ensure that other archers who haven't shot will be assisted.
- 8) No one is allowed on the tournament course before or after the tournament shooting hours except for tournament officials
- Spectators will only be allowed with unanimous approval of the group.
- 10) Rule violations can result in disqualification.
- 11) No cell phone, computers or any other electronic devices allowed on the range or bow.
- 12) Tournament officials will have communication devices for emergencies and range duties.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct can result in disqualifications.


